There was not a great number of birds, even on the feeders, but we did see blue tits, great tits, chaffinches, greenfinches, woodpeckers, lapwings, greylag geese, a male pheasant (so very highly coloured), and the usual mixture of coots, moorhens, and mallards. Two of us also saw a female deer with her young galloping through the woods – and we didn't even need binoculars for that.

Classical Music : Leader Derick Johnson



Olive Mercer presented us with November's selection beginning with J. S. Bach's Concerto in A minor for violin and orchestra played by the English Chamber Orchestra conducted by Alexander Schneider with Isaac Stern playing the violin. This is a well-loved favourite. This was followed by F. Giuliani's Nocturne in C minor for soprano and strings played by the Ensemble Antonio Vivaldi accompanied by the soprano, Hoo Hyeon Jeon. The voice of this small Korean girl was a revelation. Mozart's Lodron Night Music No 1 played by the Capella Istropolitana conducted by Wolfgang Sobotka completed our programme before the break; this had been another seldom heard work which was quite new to most of us. After the break for tea/coffee and nibbles, we heard Johann Hummel's Trio for Flute, Cello and Piano in A with Lise Daoust on the flute, Carmen Picard on the piano, and Elizabeth Dolin on the cello. This was followed by Peter Tchaikovsky's "Souvenir D'un Lieu Cher" {memory of a dear place} performed by the Russian National Orchestra conducted by Mikhail Pletnev with Gil Shaham on the violin; this had originally been written as "Trois Morceaux Pour Violon et Piano" {three pieces for violin and piano} and later arranged for an orchestra by Alexander Glazunov. We finished with David N. Johnson's Trumpet Tune in A with Christopher Herrick on the organ; this concluded the afternoon of mostly little heard music which we all enjoyed.

On 11th November 18 of the group visited Keats House in Hampstead. Keats House was built in 1815 as a pair of semi-detached houses known as Wentworth Place. Keats lodged in the smaller dwelling with his friend, Charles Brown, from 1818 to 1820 and wrote some of his best loved poems there. The Brawn(e) family lived in the larger side of the house and in the autumn of 1818 Keats fell in love with Miss Fanny Brawn. In the collection at the house we saw the engagement ring he gave to Fanny and also some dresses and hats worn by the actress who played the part of Fanny in the film “Bright Star”.

Our last outing in October was to Greenwich Park. After entering by the side gate, we saw the newly planted beds of winter pansies and polyanthus. The trees were still looking colourful, and here there were some very large cedar trees, which species is one of my favourites. The advantage of visiting a large park is that trees can grow to their full height and not reduced to suit the proportions of a private garden. We walked down to the bridge overlooking the pond where there were plenty of ducks. On the edge of the pond was a wonderful pampas grass which looked very majestic with its fine, white plumes. Following the path around, we saw a lovely Arbutus unedo with its clusters of white pendant flowers and strawberry red drupes which give it the common name of Strawberry Tree. I think every garden should have one. As we crossed over the road to reach the café, it was nice to see that the Bandstand is still there, because so many have now disappeared. After our coffee break, we paused to admire the view looking down towards the old naval hospital, the Queens House, the Maritime Museum, the Thames, and Canary Wharf further afield. There were many foreign students around the Observatory as we made our way down the steep path and through the avenue of trees to the lower park. The herbaceous borders still had some colour although they were past their best. It was a pleasant walk and we all enjoyed this Royal Park so near to our homes. Let's hope that the 2012 Olympics doesn't destroy this beautiful facility.
