The event will be opened at 2.30pm by Ann Widdecombe MP. Demonstrations will be given by the Southern Golden Retriever Team (as seen at Crufts) and will include a Retriever Gun Dog display, and a parade of Hearing Dog partnerships. A Shared Learning Project at Dulwich Picture Gallery: Opening up Dulwich's Visitor Books

Famous visitors to Dulwich Picture Gallery include W B Yeats, Alphonse Legros, Samuel Palmer and the Japanese writer, Soseki, who studied in England between 1900 and 1902. Many more names are hidden in Dulwich's forty nine Visitor Books dating from 1860-1905 which, although recently conserved and re-housed in special protective sleeves, remain too fragile for regular visitor access.

Scanning or photographing all 49 books, researching their contents and publishing the results on a simple database would be a major undertaking but would provide a fascinating new resource for visitors and researchers. Whether or not we find the elusive Van Gogh signature, about which there has been some speculation, the names in the book will surely be a starting point for valuable research into local and social history as well as providing a tantalising glimpse of Dulwich's past.

In order to ascertain whether a full-scale project might be feasible, the Gallery would like to invite members of the U3A to undertake a pilot project analysing two books, one from the beginning of the period and one from the end, to provide a comparison of how visitor patterns may have changed. The Project will include creating a database of names and addresses and carrying out historical research on the visitors.

Preference will be given to applicants with either professional or academic experience in historical research, an interest in local social and economic history, and some experience of researching family histories and using census data. IT skills are essential, especially familiarity with databases such as Microsoft Access and a familiarity with internet research. The Project will run for twelve weeks beginning on Thursday 20th September and the team will meet fortnightly from 2.00pm - 3.30pm. We are looking for a team of ten people; the leader will be Clare Barry from Wandsworth U3A. Creating New Groups

On the U3A Notice Board recently we asked you to name group subjects that would interest you, new and existing, and here are the results:

New Group Subjects:

Conversational Spanish, Creative Writing, Family History, Public Speaking, The Internet.

Existing Group Subjects:

Amblers (not Wednesdays), Armchair Travel, Computer Workshop, Conversational French, Play Reading, Scrabble.

Now we need to find interested members who will volunteer to lead a group, and/or provide a place to hold a group meeting where appropriate. There may be some who do not wish to lead, but would be happy to provide a venue once a month. It really isn't difficult to be a leader, especially where the whole group makes an input. Also, existing leaders may be willing to advise on getting started.

Example of Basic Requirements:

Conversational French or Spanish:	Small group, 5/6 members, once a month. Leader would require some knowledge of French or Spanish. Books available from library and bookshops. Learn together.
Creative Writing:	4/5 members, once a month. Person with some experience to lead.
Family History:	Small group once a month, maybe with some outings for research. Use books and the internet. Learn together.
Public Speaking:	Small group once a month. Leader and members to gain confidence together
The Internet:	4/5 members, once a month. Leader requires access to the Internet. Learn together.
Amblers (not Wednesdays):	Group meets once a month. 3 miles maximum. Leader can plan walks, or members can take it in turn to plan and lead.
Armchair Travel:	Group number dictated by venue, once a month. Share holiday videos and photos, and borrow travel videos and DVD's from the library, etc.
Computer Workshop:	4/5 members, once a month. Leader to have computer and basic knowledge. Learn together.
Play Reading:	Small group (to ensure there are enough character parts to read), once a month. Scripts available from library, etc.
Scrabble:	Suggest 4 to 8 members, once a month.

Classical Music 2 : Leader Derick Johnson

Michael Jordan presented his programme for April which he introduced to us as “Childhood Prodigies or Precocious Brats”. I’m sure that he was not relating this to our group as we have all passed this stage in our lives! Proceedings started on a cheerful note with Leopold Mozart’s “Toy Symphony” conducted by Sir Neville Mariner from the Academy of St. Martin’s in the Fields. Felix Mendelssohn’s Variations Concertantes CD did not function so we went on to Nicolo Paganini’s outstanding Violin Concerto No. 1 by Polish National Radio Symphony Orchestra with Ilya Kaler playing the violin. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart’s Flute Concerto No. 2 by the Swedish Chamber Orchestra with Patrick Gallois playing the Flute and then Henry Purcell’s Abdelazar Suite followed the break. BBC Symphony Orchestra conductor Sir Malcolm Arnold Michael informed us how the great composer, Purcell, began as organist at St. Paul’s Cathedral having been given the job by the established organist who had seen his great talent. The last item was unusual in that it consisted of three pieces by the Mediaeval Babes Madrigals, followed by two small pieces from my own collection of these entertaining ladies rounding off the afternoon of music.
